ASSASSIN FOUND GUILTY.

Leon Czolgosz Arraigned for Murdering the President.

HE PLEADS GUILTY.

His Lawyers Withdraw the Plea and Enter One of Not Guilty—Anarchists Charged With Conspiracy Released.

Special to Evening Messenger.

Buffalo, Sept. 24th, 4:28 p. m.—Czolgosz, the assassin of President McKinley, was found guilty of murder in the first degree.

Buffalo, Sept. 24.—The work of securing the jurors in the case of Leon F. Czolgosz for the murder of President McKinley was undertaken with acerbity yesterday and before the day was over the entire panel had been sworn, the jurors had listened to a description of the Temple of Music, where the crime was committed, had seen photographs of the interior of that structure and had been told by three surgeons what caused the death of the president and the effect of the assassin's shot upon upon the various organs of the body. They had also learned why the fatal bullet had not been located.

The presentation of the government's case began shortly before 8 o'clock when Assistant District Attorney Haller addressed the jury: "We shall show," he said, "that for some days prior to the shooting this defendant premeditated the shooting of the president. He knew that on the 6th of September the president would receive the populace in the Temple of Music; that on that day he went to the exposition, got into line with the people and approached the president; that he had a weapon concealed in his hand and as the president extended his hand in kindly greeting he fired the fatal shot. He fired two shots, in fact, one of them took effect in the abdomen and caused that mortal wound which resulted in the president's death. That in brief is the story we shall show you. Witnesses will tell you this story

and I am sure that when you have heard the evidence you will have no difficulty in reaching a verdict of murder in the first degree."

The first witness, S. J. Fields, chief engineer of the Pan-American exposition, described the ground floor plan of the Temple of Music, and was followed by Perry A. Bliss, a photographer, who presented views of the interior of the building. The remainder of the afternoon was taken up with the testimony of three physicians, who had attended the president during his last days, while the other performed the autopsy.

Dr. Harvey R. Gaylord was the first of the trio to be called. He described the location of the wounds in the stomach and the direction of the bullet. The cause of death was attributed to the gunshot wound, but fundamentally he said, it was due to changes back of the stomach, in the pancreas, caused by the "breaking down" of the material of the pancreas as a result of the passage of the bullet.

Dr. Herman Mynter followed and his testimony was of importance in as much as it brought out the fact that the reason why the fatal bullet had not been located at the autopsy was because of the unwillingness of the president's relatives to have the body further mutilated by their instruments. Dr. Mynter and Dr. Mann, who followed him, both testified that the primary cause of death was the gun shot wound in the stomach. One effect of this wound was, they said, to cause the gangrene to form in the pancreas, and the spot of poison tissue was as large as a silver dollar.

The prisoner, Czolgosz, during the morning evinced no interest whatever in the proceedings, but as the testimony was introduced he paid more attention to what was said and looked at the various witnesses closely.

The probable duration of the trial, it is believed, can be placed at two full days and if this opinion is maintained, Czolgosz's fate will be with the jury by night.

ASSAESSIN ON TRIAL.

Continued from first page.

was placed on trial Monday morning for the murder of President McKinley on Sept. 6, in the supreme court of El Paso county, Judge Truman O. White presiding. The trial began at 10 o'clock, but long before that hour the streets in the vicinity of the city hall were filled with many curious persons willing to take chances on being admitted to the courtroom, even though they knew there were but 150 seats available.

The various entrances to the building, with the exception of that on Franklin street, were closed and guarded by policemen and rigid discipline was the order of the day. Squads of blue-coated men were stationed on every landing and in a double row outside, the place of entrance to keep back the crowds, while in the station not far away were reserves ready to reinforce the detail on duty should the feelings of the people become aroused to the extent of rioting. Mounted officer paced slowly around on every side of the structure and no one was allowed stand on sidewalk for a moment, so that at no time was the crowd large.

No one outside the building saw the prisoner as he was taken from his cell to the courtroom. His guardians made



use of the tunnel under street from jail to city hall and O'Connell was brought into the courtroom only a few moments before the hour set for the opening of his trial. No person was admitted to building without a pass, signed by the chief of police, and it was necessary to show this to the police on every landing and in every corridor.

The counsel for O'Connell, ex-Supreme Court Justices Loren L. Lewis and Robert O. Titus and Carlton E. Ladd, saw him before the time for the opening of the court, but he had no more to say to them than on previous occasions when they have visited him. In view of the meagerness of the opportunity for the defense and the fact that the prisoner refuses absolutely to aid them, it is not improbable the entire proceedings will be completed within two days.

"The mental condition of the assassin will absolutely be the only defense offered," said Judge Titus.

His counsel may publicly abandon the case and merely represent O'Connell formally during the trial.

As the result of the examination of the assassin, Dr. Charles T. McDowell and Dr. Allen McLean Hamilton of New York City, the question of insanity is eliminated from the subjects on which the defense can rely for support. Both these physicians have pronounced the assassin sane.

Shortly at 10 o'clock court convened. The clerk called the names of the first panel of jurors at 10:05 o'clock. O'Connell was then brought into courtroom by deputy sheriffs and policemen. He was seated between guards directly in front of him. District Attorney Pomeroy read the charge against O'Connell at 10:30 and asked the prisoner how he pleaded.

"Guilty," responded O'Connell in a low tone.

Judge Lewis arose and addressed the court, stating that according to law this plea could not be accepted. And on behalf of the prisoner he asked that a plea of not guilty be entered.

ANARCHISTS RELEASED.

Not Sufficient Evidence to Hold These at Chicago for Conspiracy.

Chicago, Sept. 24.—The anarchists under arrest here are to go free. In the hearing before Judge Chetlain today the prosecution said there was no evidence against them and agreed to their discharge. Similar action will be taken in the case of Emma Goldman in the lower court.

Emma Goldman received the news of the liberation of her friends with a laugh.

"I guess they will have to let me go now," she said. "It has been shown the men named as conspirators with me did not conspire, and I fancy they would have been able to show that I conspired all by myself."

Maggio Case Postponed.

Albuquerque, Sept. 24.—The preliminary trial of Antonio Maggio, the anarchist arrested at Santa Rita and placed in jail at Silver City, was called before Justice Newcomb of Silver City Saturday morning, but the government attorney asked a postponement on account of the absence of several important witnesses. As soon as the postponement was announced Deputy United States Marshal Fred Fornoff served two more warrants on Maggio, charging conspiracy to assassinate President McKinley. Sheriff Goodell has the prisoner under heavy guard.

A BLOODY RACE RIOT.

Whites and Blacks Engage in Battle at Somerville.

THREE WERE KILLED

The Trouble Was Started by a Boycott Against Negro Brakemen by Conductors—Full Particulars Jars Are Unobtainable.

Brenham, Tex., Sept. 24.—A race riot occurred at Somerville shortly after 10 o'clock last night in which three men were killed and several men were wounded, one being seriously shot. On account of the early closing of the telegraph office at that place, particulars could not be procured.

The trouble began a week ago when conductors on the Montgomery branch of the Santa Fe road which runs from Somerville to Rayburn, refused to move trains with negro brakemen. This created much dissatisfaction among the negro brakemen, which spread to all negro employees, and from there to the negroes generally around Somerville, a point where the Montgomery branch intersects the main line. Conductor O'Brien was one of the officials who entered into this agreement.

Trouble has been brewing since and culminated last night in the shooting of Conductor O'Brien. Conductor O'Brien was seated at the lunch counter in Somerville when a negro appeared from the rear and shot him in the back. This seems to have been the signal for a general assault on all the railroad men in town by the negroes and a general riot ensued. The railroad men collected and returned the fire.

There was a general fight in which the whites of the town were pitted against the blacks. The negroes were well prepared and things looked gloomy for awhile.

For more than two hours the excitement was intense and it was not until the Brenham Pioneer signal corps and 100 citizens of Brenham reached there that quiet was restored. The negroes then retired. No further trouble is expected.

Conductor O'Brien was carried to the Temple hospital. He is very seriously wounded, but from a hasty diagnosis, his wound is not thought to be fatal.

DOWN TO WORK.

House Making Some Progress upon the Appropriation Bill.

Austin, Sept. 24.—The house yesterday morning discussed the amendment seeking to strike out of the appropriation bill the live stock sanitary commission appropriation.

The west Texas members were divided on the question, and representatives from other sections of the state took no interest in the discussion.

The house by a vote of 48 to 25 refused to strike out the commission. The appropriation for printing reports of the higher courts, and \$24,000, was stricken out.

The report of the commission signifies the charges that the land department levied assessments on clerks held on the table subject to call.

The house to settle with the First National bank, comptroller and attorney general, failed to report in accordance with the message sent to the legislature Saturday.

W. C. Whitaker, chief clerk in the department of education, tendered his resignation Monday morning, effective Oct. 1. Superintendent Arthur L. Force announced the appointment of W. C. Hickman of Waco, to succeed Whitaker.

The governor signed the "blind tiger" bill, prohibiting the shipment of liquor into local option districts, also the bill amending the fish and game law and the bill relating to boards of health in cities and towns.

The house late yesterday finished the appropriation bill in the committee of the whole and reported it to the house, which will be taken up at once.

In the work yesterday the house bill was trimmed about \$48,000. The bulk of that was in one item, an appropriation for supreme court reports, stricken out on motion of the finance committee because it is not now needed.

The other reductions were trivial, although two whole pages of the bill was knocked out by one vote. The total of the bill as it goes back to the house is \$6,018,000, a decrease of \$18,000 from the bill as reported by the finance committee. As twice the amount of the reduction was stricken out on motion of the finance committee, it may be said that the committee of the whole enlarged the bill.

The house struck out of the appropriation bill all of the old ranger claims. The house also struck out of the bill the claim of Clarke & Courts of Galveston, for balance on supreme court reports at \$1000 and refused to allow J. F. Hogg a commission on \$45,000 recovered on an old claim for the state.



Born in Niles, Ohio, January 29, 1849.

Was educated in the public schools and Allegheny college.

Taught several years in the public schools.

Enlisted as a private in the Twenty-third Ohio 1861.

Was Commissary Sergeant in 1862, Second Lieutenant in 1862, First Lieutenant in 1863, Captain in 1864.

Served on the staffs of Hayes, Crook and Hancock.

Was made Brevet Major of volunteers for gallantry in battle by Lincoln in 1865.

After the war he studied law and was admitted to the Ohio bar in 1867.

In 1867 settled in Canton, Ohio, and that place has been his home ever since.

Was member of congress from 1876 to 1891.

As chairman of committee on ways and means reported the tariff bill of 1890, known as the McKinley bill.

Elected governor of Ohio in 1891 was re-elected in 1893.

Was delegate-at-large to National Republican convention and member of the committee on resolutions in 1884, and supported James G. Blaine.

Was delegate-at-large from Ohio to the convention of 1888 and supported John Sherman; was chairman of the committee on resolutions.

Was delegate-at-large to convention of 1892, and was made its chairman. He received 182 votes for president, but refused to allow his name to be considered, he supporting Benjamin Harrison.

Nominated for president at the National Republican convention at St. Louis June 18, 1896 receiving 661 out of a total of 905 votes.

Was elected president in November, 1896 by a popular plurality of 600,000 votes.

Was elected president in November, 1900 by a popular plurality of 849,435 votes.

Was stricken down by the hand of an assassin on September 6, 1901.
